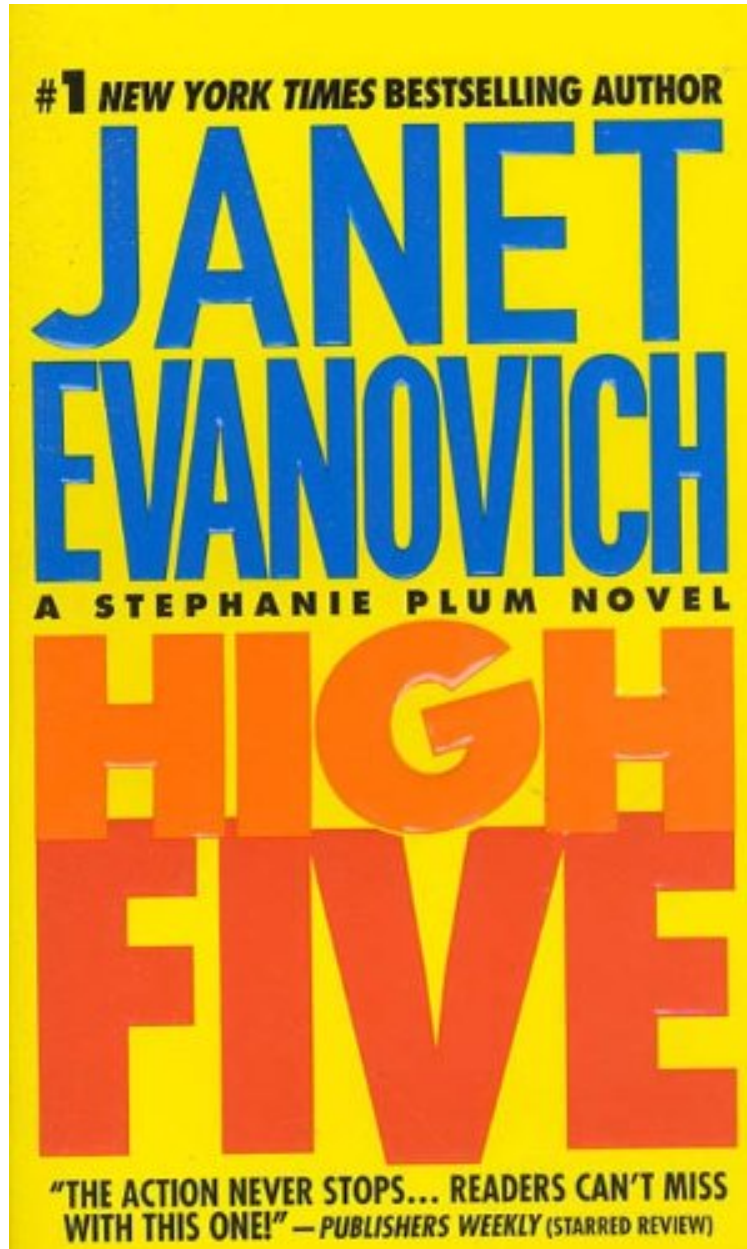

Well, Janet Evanovich's Stephanie Plum series does exactly that for me -- I know, when I pick up one of the books in these series, that the characters are going to be simultaneously endearing and outrageous, that Stephanie's going to be the cause of something blowing up, and that I'm going to laugh, and laugh, and laugh. Don't expect gritty realism from any of these books -- even though there's something so real about these whacko characters, you feel as if you know them (or would like to). This is sheer slapstick entertainment, but brilliantly executed slapstick. Ms. Evanovich's ability to interweave a thousand plot points and still keep everything straight is nothing short of phenomenal. But her real forte is her top-notch characterization. . . and those who've been keeping up with the series from the beginning can, I'm sure, see just how far some of these characters have come since the beginning. Even though she's impetuous as ever, Stephanie has grown since ONE FOR THE MONEY, as has her lover/nemesis, Joe Morelli. Keeping a concept fresh and the characters evolving and vital is no mean feat through a half-dozen books, but Ms. Evanovich seems to be doing just fine on that score, as far as this reader is concerned.
